

New England Super Lawyers Magazine Includes Two From McTeague Higbee

TOPSHAM, Maine - Two attorneys from the Topsham-based law firm McTeague Higbee were recently included in the 2010 edition of New England Super Lawyers magazine. G. William Higbee and Jeffrey Neil Young were again listed as part of the top 5% of outstanding lawyers in New England.

Attorneys are selected for inclusion through a four step process, beginning with a survey of lawyers by the independent research firm, Law & Politics. This survey is followed by an evaluation of the candidates by Law & Politics and peer evaluation by practice area. For the final selection, Law & Politics reviews the remaining candidates and researches each candidate's standing with the local licensing authority.

G. William Higbee was chosen for this honor in the specialty of Personal Injury: Plaintiff. Higbee is a partner at McTeague Higbee, having founded the firm in 1976. He practices personal injury and federal workers compensation law with a concentration in construction accidents, asbestos litigation, hearing loss and other occupational diseases. Higbee is a member of the Bath-Brunswick Bar Association, Maine State Bar Association, Maine Trial Lawyers Association, the Plaintiffs' Asbestos Litigation Group, and the American Association for Justice. Higbee earned his B.A. from DePauw University and his law degree from Washington University School of Law. He is a resident of Brunswick.

Jeffrey Neil Young has been selected for inclusion in New England Super Lawyers in the specialties of Employment Litigation: Plaintiff and Employment and Labor, Class Action/Mass Torts. Young joined McTeague Higbee in 1988. His practice focuses on representing employees and unions in employment disputes, concentrating on age, sex, race and disability discrimination matters as well as wage and hour disputes. Young serves as a chapter editor for BNA's Employment Discrimination Law treatise and is a past co-chair of the Maine State Bar Association's Labor and Employment Law section. He is a graduate of Brown University and Case Western Reserve University School of Law. Young is a resident of Cumberland Foreside.
